# **North American Mammals**

Also known as pronghorns, fastest mammal in Western Hemisphere with speeds up to 55 mph Distantly related to 40-Across, large, muscular bovines with shaggy coats, weighing up to 1.5 tons Also known as the red lynx, solitary and medium-sized, with black-tipped stubby tail (hence name) "Cape" and "water" species are native to Africa and Asia, but early Europeans misnamed 42-Across Nocturnal, territorial ambush predator, most widespread of large mammals in Western Hemisphere From Alaska to Mexico, brown-furred with distinguishing humps over shoulders, up to 800 pounds Marsupial omnivores described by 1611 John Smith: "Head of a swine...tail like a rat...bigness of a cat" Nocturnal, third largest of global rodents, with sharp quills, for protection since weighty and slow Earliest mammal domesticated for ag for fleece, meat, and milk...nearly 6 million in USA and Canada

Found in Borneo and Sumatra, intelligent primate with reddish-brown hair...last of millions-old line Usually following "giant", China's endemic bears, with a bold black and white coat, eats bamboo parts Largest global wild herd is found in Russia, numbering up to a million, males with an impressive rack Found in Far East Russia, hunters weighing as much as 600 pounds, thick coat of dark brown stripes Predator native to Central and South Asia's mountain ranges, up to 15,000 feet...beautiful and elusive From the Himalayas to Siberia, closely related to bison, with dense long fur and dark-colored horns

# **African Mammals**

Native, medium-sized nocturnal insectivore, with long pig-like snout for sniffing food, long erect ears Fastest land animal at up to 80 mph, small-headed with black tear-like facial streaks, evenly spotted Native to tropical Africa, with course black hair and a bare face and palms...seen using tools to forage In savannahs and woodlands, earth's tallest and largest ruminant, can be "gregarious and social" In the south, also known as wildebeests, same family as antelopes, known to graze with 90-Across The Gambian variety with an average length of 3 feet and 9 pounds, stores grains in cheek pouches One of the largest herbivores, with one or two horns, using their lips to pluck food -- no front teeth Dazzingly striped grazers, each uniquely so, used to deter biting flies (?), only predator is a 25-Across

# **South American Mammals**

Giant native rodents, found in savannahs and forests near water bodies, social with groups up to 100 Largest cat species in the Americas, spotted yellow coat, kills prey directly by massive bite to the skull Same family as alpacas, sturdy trainable natives can carry as much as 30% of their weight up to 8 miles Large herbivores, up to 700 pounds and 3 feet at shoulders, similar in shape to a pig, with a short trunk Common species of sloths (its cousins more mobile), tree dwellers descend every 8 days to defecate
